The Grand Master's Message

Most Worshipful, Right Worshipful, Worshipful, my Brethren, Ladies, and Guests:

Good afternoon.

It would be impossible for me to express my feelings at this particular moment!

Just let me say, I am deeply humbled and greatly honored to be in this position, just as all previous Brethren who have come to this point in their Masonic experience.

You know, during introductions at Grand Master's visits, I have learned that the first item that needs to be done is to introduce your wife, who, if forgotten, can be a somewhat expensive and disastrous proposition. I would like to, at this time, introduce my wife of fifty one years, Susan. Please let the record show I did NOT give her all the gray hair she has. These were caused by our three children, Anna Golladay and Michael Kregbaum, her husband; Mary, otherwise known as Miki and her husband, Lt. Col. Retired USAF Sean Hanlen, their daughters Erin and Catherine, or KK, and our son James, the third.

Anna, is a substitute United Methodist Minister in Chattanooga, Tennessee and I do not know if this ever happened to her, but as I was listening to a radio program over lunch one day, they tell the story of a lady minister who was giving the Sunday sermon, and after two and a half hours of preaching, stopped to take a drink of water. She made the mistake and asked the congregation if anyone had anything to say. From the back of the room, a small child said AMEN! I hope this does not happen to me this afternoon, and I promise to be brief.

As many of you do not know, I had the "great pleasure" of attending Randolph Macon Academy in Front Royal as a Post Graduate student, be-

But, during the course of events, we had monthly Chapel on Wednesday morning, where all the Cadets would gather in the on-site Chapel and hear a speaker, usually a Methodist Minister, give a short sermon or talk.

One Wednesday, we were addressed by Reverend John A. McHenry, who I believe at the time, was the Minister of the Annandale United Methodist Church in Annandale, Virginia, who spoke on Four Things by Henry Van Dyke. He said:

Four things a man must learn to do, if it would make his record true:

- To Think without confusion clearly
- To Love one's fellow man sincerely
- To Act from honest motives purely
- To trust in God and Heaven securely.

This pretty much sums up Freemasonry. For some strange reason, I still have with me this saying that was in the bulletin that Wednesday morning.

My theme this year is "Freemasonry, A Family Affair." Needless to say, Freemasonry has been a big part of my family for many years. My church family, first, my personal family next, and Freemasonry, in that order. Although it may seem to have gotten a little out of order on occasion.

I guess my "life lessons about Freemasonry" were learned rather early in life, and I often think back on what they meant. This had a lot to do with C. Vernon Eddy Chapter, Order of DeMolay in Winchester, Virginia.

The first time we went to conclave, which is another word for a DeMolay convention, I had the opportunity to meet Most Worshipful Alfred Douglas Smith, Jr., Past Grand Master, who, at the time was the Executive Officer for DeMolay in Virginia. He had a way with the young men and would give a "rousing" entrance whenever he was introduced. If you are interested, I will tell you privately about his introduction later.

From there, I had the opportunity to meet and enjoy the company of others, who I later learned were members of the Masonic Fraternity. Most Worshipful Charles E Wallace, Right Worshipful Odie R. Howell, Jr., Brother Julian Baum, Right Worshipful Augie W. Boley, and many others from all over the Commonwealth. This made an impression on me as I was growing in DeMolay and their attitude toward the future of an organization composed of young men, who let them lead, to make their own decisions and live with them, either good or bad! was available for the asking, but you had to ask, as it was not freely given. These men wanted the young men to make the decisions and live by them. This was the first "family:" if you may, that I was subjected to.

I have always been impressed with how they conducted themselves when around the DeMolay Boys and around themselves in their daily interactions with whatever they were discussing at the time.

One instance, in particular comes to mind. One of the Advisors of C. Vernon Eddy Chapter, of which I was a member, was the operating manager of the local Potomac Edison Electric Company branch in Winchester. Another was a lineman who worked for the same company. Whenever they were together at a DeMolay meeting, it was always "Brother" or as I later found out "Worshipful," but while at work, it was always Mr. Fisher or Mr. Anderson.

Talk about being impressed regarding Masonic protocol.

Time passed, and I finally reached the age where I could no longer be an active DeMolay and was time for college. I attended Ferrum Junior College in Ferrum, Virginia, for two years, and it was a great learning experience, one where I learned firsthand about the "liquid refreshment" that was indigenous to that area of Virginia. Although at a Methodist school, we did a little sampling of the man made refreshment!

After graduating and attending the University of Richmond School of Business, I needed to return home to take over the family business. I looked up Right Worshipful Lokie Voight upon my return and inquired about the Masonic Lodge in Winchester and prompt-

ly petitioned, and as they say, the rest is history.

I have been very fortunate to be a member of many Masonic organizations, and this has been an education, in and of itself. Each organization has a story to tell whether it is its ritual work or its rich history. But more importantly, it is the Brethren that keeps me coming back, time and time again. No matter where you go in our Country, you will always make a new Masonic friend or renew old acquaintances. Talk about a large family.

This brings us to the present.

We need to make Freemasonry the preeminent men's organization that it can be and improve on the delivery from our Lodges, both in the community and in our individual Lodge rooms and our interactions with everyday people with whom we come in contact. Whether it is in the store, post office, or our daily jobs.

Say a kind word to someone who needs a "pick me up" during the day, pat someone on the back and say "well done" (even if you could have done it better) or just a smile! It does not take much, and it is surprising how far it will go in making their day and maybe even yours a little bit better.

A study by the Northern Jurisdiction of the Scottish Rite noted that charity, values, Fraternity, selfless giving, high moral standards are just a few of the



qualities that resonate with the non-Masonic population.

We also need to strike a balance between ritual, caring for each other, and social time. A three legged stool, if you will. It seems that, over the years, we have gotten out of balance somewhat with caring for each other, and social time taking a back seat coming in at second place. I would suggest that for a Masonic Lodge to be successful, we need to go back to the proverbial threelegged stool where ritual, caring for each other, and social time are on equal footing. We also need to have eminently qualified Brethren move into the Chair of Worshipful Master to lead and guide their individual Lodges to bigger and better things-community involvement, better social times with each other both in and out of our Lodges, increased Family activities and the like.

As I told the District Deputy Grand Masters at our Conference in September, WE work for you. It is our job to point the way and provide the tools necessary to get the job done. Communication is a two-way street. Your Grand Lodge Officers are not mind readers. We appreciate communication, whether good or bad. Please let us know, in the friendliest manner, and we, the Grand Lodge Officers and the various Grand Lodge Committee Chairmen, will make an attempt to address your concern. I repeat myself, WE WORK FOR YOU, and we want to make you and your Lodge successful during the next year.

We have a golden opportunity to achieve our goals and objectives.

Well, how do we continue to build a healthy Lodge?

The Apostle Paul, in First and Second Corinthians talks about gifts, both

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spiritual and non-spiritual. What are your gifts? Is it ritual, is it leadership, is it great ideas for better community activities, are you good at organizing, or are you just good at doing the myriad of things that keeps a Masonic Lodge ticking from month to month? Are you good at accounting and budgetary matters?

Whatever your gifts are, we can use them-both in our Grand Lodge, individual Lodges or in the community in general.

We have improved several of the programs to assist our Lodges in this manner. This includes a revamped Relief Program to assist our Brethren, their widows and orphans, if they need assistance on an almost immediate basis. This Relief Program will be spearheaded through your District Deputy Grand Masters, who have been empowered to administer the program.

A new and revamped Lodge Services Program has been put in place, not to tell you what to do or how to do it, but to guide our Lodges in developing a healthy Lodge and making them an integral part of the community.

A revamped Public Relations Committee is actively working on how to assist each Lodge in writing a public service announcement and much, much more

Adopt a School Program will be another program that is offered, where our Lodges can assist the schools in our communities in their outreach.

Are you looking for Leadership Development and educational opportunities? The Virginia Masonic University may be just the thing to assist.

Be a Brother and perhaps bring a neighbor that cannot drive at night who lives on the way to a Lodge function where you are going. Does your Lodge have activities for the families, other than the yearly Lodge or District picnic?

Does your Lodge have a five and/or a ten-year long-term plan with goals and objectives? If so, are they followed? This means both in leadership, financial and/or community programs and activities.

We will again support the Youth Organizations in the Commonwealth, DeMolay, Job's Daughters, and Rainbow for Girls, and will work to assist them in growing and becoming a resource for our young people. Please be on the lookout for the Youth Summits scheduled around the Commonwealth during the months of April and May of next year, and we solicit your support to become active.

It should be noted that many of the improvements in the above program directions has been a direct result of Most Worshipful Douglas V. Jones' effort to improve the Craft during his two years as Grand Master and beginning work on rebuilding a healthy Lodge! We are very much on the way to doing so.

Now is the time for a full implementation of those efforts. Your Grand Lodge and its officers stand ready, willing, and able to assist you in your efforts. If we are lacking something, please let us know.

As many of you know, I am a product of the Methodist Church. One of our founders, Mr. John Wesley made a famous statement, and I believe it is appropriate to end my message to you this afternoon. It goes something like this: "Do all the good you can, By all the means you can, In all the ways you can, In all the places you can, At all the times you can, To all the people you can, As long as ever you can."

I am firmly convinced that if we do this, Freemasonry and our lives will be improved and get stronger in the years to come.

Sure, it is tough, but if it is worth doing, then we can get the job done.

Thank you so much, for this opportunity to lead our gentle Craft. I am deeply humbled and greatly moved, but remember, together, we can accomplish much.

As we lead our gentle Craft into the third decade of a new Century, it needs to be said that this is a community effort! Communication needs to go both ways, up from the Lodges through the District Deputy Grand Masters to the Grand Lodge Officers, and also in reverse.

I plan to make several additions to the Masonic Herald in future issues. One is "Meet your Grand Lodge Officers, which would include a short biography of the elected Grand Lodge Officers. Nothing elaborate, but just something so you will know them when they come to visit.

Another which I hope to add to future issues is a report from the various Committee Chairmen as to their goals and objectives for their year to assist you in building a healthy Lodge.

Together, we can make Freemasonry the preeminent men's fraternal organization it is meant to be.

The Grand Master proceeded to open the 243rd Grand Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of Virginia.

Friday's session included the Address to the Grand Lodge of Most Worshipful Douglas Vernon Jones, as well as a memorial service conducted by Most Worshipful Alan Wayne Adkins, Past Grand Master.

James Noah Hillman Awards and Seymour Jonas Levy Awards for those Lodges that qualified will be presented by the District Deputy Grand Masters when they officially visit the Lodges during 2022.

The Perfect Ashlar Award was presented to Brother Larry Clarke Burruss, a member of Marshall Lodge No. 39.

The Reid James Simmons Award for Ritualistic Excellence was presented to Right Worshipful Gregory Dean Hosaflook of Day Lodge No. 58. During Friday morning's session, Most Worshipful Brother Jones recognized his distinguished guests and the Past Grand Masters of Masons in Virginia.

The Report of the Board of Governors of the Masonic Home of Virginia was presented and approved. The report of the Finance Committee was given, and the budget for 2022 was presented and approved.

Friday's agenda included a report from the Committee on Foreign Correspondence, which submitted the following resolution: "Be it resolved that the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge, A.F. & A.M., of the Commonwealth of Virginia, shall extend fraternal recognition to the Masonic Grand Lodge of Amapa-Brazil." This resolution was adopted.

The Report of the Past Grand Masters was presented by Most Worshipful Alan Wayne Adkins and adopted.

The Grand Master accepted a motion to elect Worshipful Faron William Holland as a Trustee of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge, A.F. & A.M., of Virginia to replace Worshipful Norman Odell Milligan. The motion passed as presented.

Committee meetings were held at 3:30 P.M., and a banquet for the delegates and distinguished guests was held on Friday evening at 6:30 P.M. The Grand Master called the Craft from Refreshment to Labor at 8:30 A.M. on Saturday morning, November 6, 2021.

Two John Blair, Jr. Awards were presented on Friday to Most Worshipful James Dean Cole, Past Master of Craighill Lodge No. 160 and Most Worshipful Geary F. Laird, Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Kentucky. Two additional John Blair, Jr. Awards were presented on Saturday to Right Worshipful Claude Ashley Bass, Jr., Past Master of Metropolitan Lodge No. 11, and Worshipful Samuel Moseley Jones, Past Master of Reedy Spring Lodge No. 203. In addition, the George Washington Distinguished Service Medal was presented to Most Worshipful James Edward Litten, Past Master of Mountain Home Lodge No. 263.

A Resolution was presented to make Most Worshipful Alan W. Adkins, PGM, Grand Secretary Emeritus upon his retirement as Grand Secretary. Most Worshipful Brother Adkins served faithfully and well for twenty-four years in the Office of Grand Secretary for the Grand Lodge of Virginia. For his service, the Grand Lodge of Virginia will be forever indebted.

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The Grand Master's Award of Excellence for the Outstanding Sponsoring Body of a Virginia Chapter of the International Order of DeMolay was presented to Kempsville Lodge No. 196 by Right Worshipful Richard McCoy Young, Executive Officer in Virginia. Right Worshipful Arthur Lee Pendleton, on behalf of the Virginia DeMolay Foundation, also presented the Howard K. Smith, Sr. Leadership Award for individual support of the Virginia DeMolay Foundation to Worshipful John Dolan Stallings, III.

Most Worshipful James Winfield Golladay, Jr. 176th Grand Master

James Winfield Golladay, Jr. was born in Winchester, Virginia, on September 1, 1945. He graduated from James Wood High School in 1963 and completed post-graduate work at Randolph-Macon Academy in 1964. He graduated from Ferrum Junior College in 1966, with an Associate of Arts Degree and later attended the University of Richmond, School of Business until returning to Stephens City to manage the family retail lumber business. Following his father's passing, he became President of the business and operated it until 1993. He is now engaged in the Real Estate business as the Property Manager for Crum Realty, Inc. in Winchester.

Brother Golladay was made a Master Mason in Winchester Hiram Lodge No. 21 on March 5, 1968, where he is a 50-Year Masonic Veteran and honorary member and served as its Worshipful Master in 1976 and as Secretary from 2005-2018. He was District Deputy Grand Master of Masonic District No. 3 in 2008. He was the Grand Purveyor in 2014. He served on the Board of Governors of the Masonic Home of Virginia for six years. He was elected Grand Junior Deacon in November 2015.

Brother Golladay served Worshipful Master of Spurmont Lodge No. 98 in 2011. He is an honorary member and Life Member in Perpetuity of Eureka Lodge No. 195, honorary member of Civil War Research Lodge No. 1865 and holds membership in Virginia Research Lodge No. 1777, and A. Douglas Smith, Jr. Research Lodge No. 1949. He is a member of the Valley of Martinsburg, Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite and was invested Knight Commander Court of Honour in 2004 and coroneted a 33°

Hines Chapter (DC) and Virginia Chapter, **Past** Grand Preceptor, Sovereign Grand United States Preceptory of the (2019-2020);Puissant Past

Sovereign of Shenandoah Conclave, Red Cross of Constantine; Past Excellent Chief of Virginia Council No 12 and King Darius Council No. 17, Knight Masons; Past Sovereign Master of Hartley Carmichael Council No. 3. George Washington Council No. 106, Martinsburg Council No. 359, and HAFOVA Council No. 442, Allied Masonic Degrees; and Life Member of Old Dominion Chapter No. 364, National Sojourners. He holds membership in the Virginia College Societas Rosicruciana, the Royal Order of Scotland and numerous other Appendant Masonic Bodies. He was a recipient of the Outstanding District Deputy Grand Master Award in 2007 - 2008; the Order of the Purple Cross from the York Rite Sovereign College of North America and the Charles Augustus Grice Merit Award from the Grand Commandery of Virginia. Brother Golladay is a Past Master Councilor of C. Vernon Eddy Chapter and a sixty-year member and the recipient of the Order of Chevalier, Legion of Honor, Distinguished Service and Representative DeMolay Awards.

Brother Golladay has also been very active in the community. Within Frederick County, he is a Past Chairman of the Frederick County Planning Commission and the Winchester-Frederick County Economic Development Commission. He is a life member of Stephens City United Methodist Church, where he has served as Chairman, Board of Trustees.

Brother Golladay is married to the former Susan McIntosh Porterfield of Charles Town, West Virginia, and they have two daughters, Anna McIntosh and Mary Isabelle and a son, James W. III, and two granddaughters.

Gino Warren Williams was born in Roanoke, Virginia, on December 28, 1959. He was raised and has spent his entire life in Floyd County, Virginia. He graduated from Floyd County High School in 1978. He received a BA Degree from Virginia Tech in 1982 and a Juris Doctor Degree from the Marshall-Wythe School of Law at the College of William and Mary in 1986. After graduation, he joined the law firm of Lineberry and Profitt, where he practiced for seven years. Want to be an Actor?

So, you have always wanted to become an actor. Well, here is that chance you have been waiting for, and you do not have to go to Hollywood to make your dream come true.

It all starts in your Symbolic Lodge with the Ritual. Think of it as the script you would have to learn for a part in a movie, or theater production. Ritual, just like a script, is to be acted out, and not just read. Each word needs to be pronounced precisely, placing the proper emphasis in the right places to impress upon the candidate the story you are telling. The only way for you to perfect this type of actor presentation is by practice, rehearsing with others and holding critique sessions. Treat it as your audition to become that actor you have always wanted to be.

The most important thing about Ritual delivery, whether it be in a Lodge, or an appendant body, is your overall presentation. You must insure that what you are saying sounds sincere.

This is where acting comes in. The spotlight is now on you. Your aim: to hold the candidate's undivided attention to every single word you are saying. When reciting Ritual, the Lodge room should be quiet as a tomb. The only person to be heard is you presenting the Ritual. The impact this makes upon the candidate, should be an everlasting memory. Those on the sidelines will surely be impressed.

My recommendation is to practice Ritual every chance you get. Read and recite it aloud. Try different techniques with the placing of emphasis in the proper place(s). One method is to verbally or mentally underline words you want emphasized. Keep a dictionary handy for proper pronunciation. Nothing is more embarrassing than pronouncing a word incorrectly. Now, if you do not have a dictionary, use the Internet and research the words that give you a problem. Google will pronounce it for you and even give a definition. If you do not have a computer? Go to your nearest library. Sure, it is a lot of homework, but to become that actor you have wanted to be for so long, it is well worth devoting some preparation time. This is where rehearsal plays a big part.

Your screen test without traveling to Hollywood will be center stage in your Lodge. Make it an impressive one. You can do it. In the words of our late Brother, Norman Vincent Peale, "You Can, if you think You Can."

So many of Virginia's Masons owe a deep and abiding gratitude to Most Worshipful Brother Adkins on many levels.



"To the Esoterics: Bad News, Brother. You will not find the word 'alchemy' anywhere in this book."

This articulate, plain-spoken, thoughtful, and even funny work must rank among the most, er..., well, practical books about Freemasonry ever produced. Worshipful Brother Gallagher takes his stand straight out of the gate:

In Lodges all over the world, a dusty old Brother will stand at a lectern and read you a forty-eight-page paper on the peculiar history of the beehive, and is that not always nice? But you may be asking yourself, like so many who have demitted from membership before you, That is great but what has it got to do with me?

Brother Gallagher comes across as a wise guy, in every sense of the term.

Over one decade of near-weekly get togethers, rituals, aprons, memorization, coffee pots, and dirty jokes, I have had some great times as a Mason.

The banner across the top of his book's cover should warn the reader: the only book about Masonic symbolism you will ever need! Understand!

But listening to a lecture from a Past Master on Alchemy, Apollo, the Sun, and the Phallus, I slipped into a state of gnosis, or an altered state, in which I was no longer present in that room, but rather floating away into a world of my own making, which looked eerily like the dining room downstairs where Dave was making his famous spaghetti.

Indeed, it takes a pretty esoteric paper to be indecipherable to the average Mason. Most times the confusion I see is of wondering *what is being said has to do with us*. Emphasis added.

Let those who delight in the obfuscation of the "secrets" of Freemasonry with vague references to the ancient mysteries; Enlightenment values; esoterica; the occult; strict observance; and other such logorrhea without reference to the sources and support for such exercises beware. This book rigorously gets its message across: Freemasonry matters now.

Brother Gallagher guides the reader towards his main goal: taking the working tools of the Craft and applying them to contemporary, twenty-first century living. In part inspired by the works of Roscoe Pound¹, he lays out his philosophy with a smattering of psychology and loads of common sense.

Ever wonder why Masonic Ritual deems the plumb, square and level the "Immovable Jewels?" Brother Gallagher, beginning with the Fellowcraft definitions of these working tools, explains, each in turn, their mathematical uses. He even indulges in playing some nifty tricks with the circumpunct and other practical applications of these instruments.

He explains that the precepts and proofs of geometry may be the only things in the universe that are objectively true...there is no universe where the intersecting points of two overlapping arcs centered on a straight line do not create a perfect perpendicular.

It simply is what it is. Immovable.

It cannot be argued against, It's not even science. It simply IS. That, my friends, is immovable. And I believe that the square is a Masonic symbol that assures us that there is such thing as right and wrong or universal morality.

The reader quickly learns that "practical" does not mean easy or simple. Yet Brother Gallagher endeavors to build his case with basic terminology, without Roget's exhibitionism, and with one logical proposition at a time.

He covers every working tool, beginning with the Ritual explanations

of each. From thence he draws out the moral application of each. This inevitably leads to the practical, everyday usage of each tool and its ability to help build character and focus on the compelling nature of morality.

Brother Gallagher concedes that "thinking is hard." But if there is one thing that does not get enough credit in Masonry, it's the benefit of dry, repetitive memory work.

He concedes the importance of Preston's influence on the Ritual, but not to display his own erudition.

He explains
Preston's commitment to
Masonry as a

means of education and to impart certain subjects considered essential and relevant to 18th century men. So Brother Gallagher asks: why not do the same for twenty-first century Brethren?



to change the subject.

Brother Gallagher further proposes an idea too seldom imparted to the Craft: the duty to help imposes a reciprocal obligation to ask for help. If Masons do have an obligation to provide relief from a Brother's distress, those in distress, knowing the Obligations of their Brethren, have an equal duty to seek such assistance. How many times

citizen. He has a duty to himself, both to properly care for himself and to ensure that the people and institutions that fuel him are properly maintained.

And a Mason is dutiful.

For example, he discusses at length a Mason's duty to help, aid, and assist Brethren in distress, even providing several examples of how not to help.

When sharing your story, the Dodger is trying to do anything but listen, from looking at their phone to darting their eyes around the room for literally anything they can use as an excuse to leave the conversation or to at least signal you

have Brethren stated, when informed of a Brother's unfulfilled need, "If only I had known, I could have helped?" The most overlooked tool in a Mason's toolbox is simply asking for help.

Morality, moreover, goes beyond ethics: Living morally, however, is vastly different and much more difficult because it involves doing the right things when you do not want to, which means that to be moral you have to have character...We build good character by responding in ways that let us replace bad reactions with good reactions, through analysis, practice, internalization, and accountability.

Brother Gallagher even addresses current events, a subject Masons shy away from, perhaps because of the Institution's ban on discussions of religion and politics within their Lodges. But what about outside our Lodges? Do we tend to shun or ignore Brethren with whom we disagree? Gallagher warns: At the time of writing this book, the country is in a surprisingly² dismal state. Social media keeps us corralled in information bubbles. Politics has gotten more extreme. The occasional building is burned to the ground. A global quarantine has kept most of us in our homes and stressed. It has caused a lot of unkind words to be exchanged, Online and in person, even among Brothers, among whom no contention should ever exist. In times like this, the self-control to stop oneself from making things worse, and participating in a kind of toxic brotherhood is critical.

That is so because the most excellent tenets³ of our profession include friendship, morality and brotherly love.

Accordingly, Brother Gallagher offers plenty of tips for maintaining those tenets and fostering tolerance, understanding, patience, kindness towards those whose differences may tend to ignite what remains of our hair. That discussion of course reminds the reader of silence as a Masonic virtue.

Finally, what happens next? There is plenty enough to distract you if you need to kill a little time between your third degree⁴ and discovering the meaning of life. With characteristic chutzpah, Brother Gallagher answers the question:

Set this book down on your desk or coffee table and leave it there...to remind you that wisdom and philosophy is in the doing and not the knowing. This book is bright orange for a reason, after all.

He reminds us that every good symbol is supposed to give you a call to action.

Brother Gallagher succeeds handsomely in conferring twenty-first century power on symbols used by the Craft for over three centuries. This thoughtful and compelling book will enhance the interest of the inquiring profane, relieve the tedium of repeated Ritual that may have lost its luster for many, and serve the Craft well with its insightful and inspiring views on the meanings of Masonic semiotics.

And, at times, it is funny. So, practice, practice, practice.



Kindness and Brotherly Affection

I have had an interest in Masonry for many years before becoming a member, but never took the necessary steps. It just never felt like the right thing to do at the time. *Romans* 8:28 says, And we know that in all things God works for the good of those who love Him, who have been called according to His purpose. That is my favorite *Bible* verse and has been for many years. It speaks to the idea that you may not always understand the why, or even reach the end state you envisioned, but everything is always working together for your good.

I have been to several Lodge installations. Every time, there has always been one part that hits me square in the heart: the very last part from the Installing Officer, before the Installing Marshal makes the proclamation. To my knowledge, it does not have a specific name, but I think of it as an Installation Charge. It charges the Brethren of the Lodge, to include the officers, with certain duties and responsibilities, and to me, it is the pinnacle of Freemasonry: kindness and brotherly affection toward one another.

Installation Charge:

Brethren, such is the nature of our Constitution; that as some must of necessity, rule and teach, so others must of course, learn to submit and obey. Humility in both is an essential duty. The officers who are appointed to govern your Lodge, and whom you have selected for that purpose, are sufficiently conversant with the rules of propriety and the laws of the Institution, to avoid exceeding the powers with which they are entrusted; and you are, as Masons, of too generous dispositions to envy their preferment. I therefore trust that you will have

but one aim, to please each other, and unite in the grand design of being happy and communicating happiness.

Finally, my Brethren, as this association has been formed and perfected in so much unanimity and concord, in which we greatly rejoice, so may it long continue. May you long enjoy every satisfaction and delight which disinterested friendship can afford. May kindness and brotherly affection distinguish your conduct as men and as Masons. Within your peaceful walls may your children's children celebrate with joy and gratitude the transactions of this auspicious solemnity and may the tenets of our profession be transmitted through your Lodge, pure and unimpaired, from generation to generation.

Masonry is the only organization to my knowledge that so greatly emphasizes these things: unity, pleasing each other, kindness, and brotherly affection. I have served in the United States Marine Corps for over thirteen years, and I have not felt this sort of kindness and affection throughout the Corps. I have those Marines with whom I am awfully close, and for whom I would do anything in the world, at the drop of a hat; but the things that I have felt in the last year and a half of Masonry, are entirely indescribable. This is what I will miss. I will miss the kindness and brotherly affection. I will miss my Brethren here in Prince George Lodge No. 115, and

I will miss the Brethren of Masonic District 29.

Despite all that, I have been able to learn and retain during this time, and accolades received, those accomplishments were not attained by me alone. It was through the willingness and sacrifice of others that any of this was possible. Time being the one thing on this earth that can never be replenished, there were Brethren that gave it freely, and without expectation of repayment. What we have done for ourselves alone dies with us; what we have done for others and the world remains and is immortal, Brother Albert Pike. May we always seek to do good for others and for the world.

Brethren, I would simply like to say, "Thank you." Those two words do not begin to express my gratitude and are all too often misconstrued for being too impersonal, but I deeply and earnestly mean it. It was quite the rocky start to this journey, but without having fully known who I was, my true character, or my desires, you all took me in. I genuinely appreciate that. Thank you for letting me become a part of this amazing Craft. Thank you for treating me with kindness and brotherly affection, with dignity, and respect, for teaching me, for setting an example, molding, and inspiring me. I will continue to apply my mind to the attainment of useful knowledge, and to help, teach, and mentor whenever possible. Again, and sincerely, thank you. May God bless you all, this Lodge, and this magnificent Fraternity.

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The Legacy Continues

Many of you may have heard of the Masonic Home of Virginia. Many have visited, while many others have actually experienced the gift it has given to the Masons of Virginia and their families over the years. It began in 1889, with the foresight and generosity of two Masons, Dr. Potts and A. G. Babcock. Dr. Potts advocated the need for a home for widows and children of deceased Masons. Mr. Babcock made an initial gift of \$5,000 to start the Home. In 1890, the Board of Governors met for the first time and accepted the Charter and elected officers. Shortly thereafter, Mr. Babcock donated a gift of his farm consisting of almost half the ninety-three acres the Home currently occupies. Due to the foresight and generosity of many along the way, what began as a Home for children evolved into a Home

Today, we continue as a well-respected non-profit continuing care retirement community (CCRC) where active seniors come to enjoy their retirement and receive the care they need when and if they need it. Our history is rich with the stories of those who

serving seniors in the 1970's.

have lived at the Home for well over a century. Over eight hundred children and almost thirteen hundred residents, along with their families, have enjoyed not only the foresight and generosity of its founders but the many gifts of other Masons throughout the years via volunteered services and generous donations.

In the late 1990's, James Dean Cole began serving on the Board of Governors when elected to the Grand Line. Shortly after his term as Grand Master in 2001, he was hired as the Development Officer for his talents and experience. In 2006, he was promoted to Chief Executive Officer where he successfully served until being installed as Sovereign Grand Commander of the Supreme Council in 2019. His foresight and generosity with his time and talents evolved into a servant leader at the Home, where he flourished. Upon his installation to the Supreme Council, he was honored by the Board of Governors with a resolution naming the chapel, the James Dean Cole Chapel. This dedication took place at the most recent Masonic Family Day in front of hundreds comprised of residents, staff

and supporters from across the Commonwealth. In addition, James Dean Cole was honored at a Gala in Alexandria for his dedicated service to both the Home and the Supreme Council. The proceeds from the event benefit both organizations. As you can see, the legacy continues at the Masonic Home of Virginia with all our residents, staff and family continuing as the benefactors.
